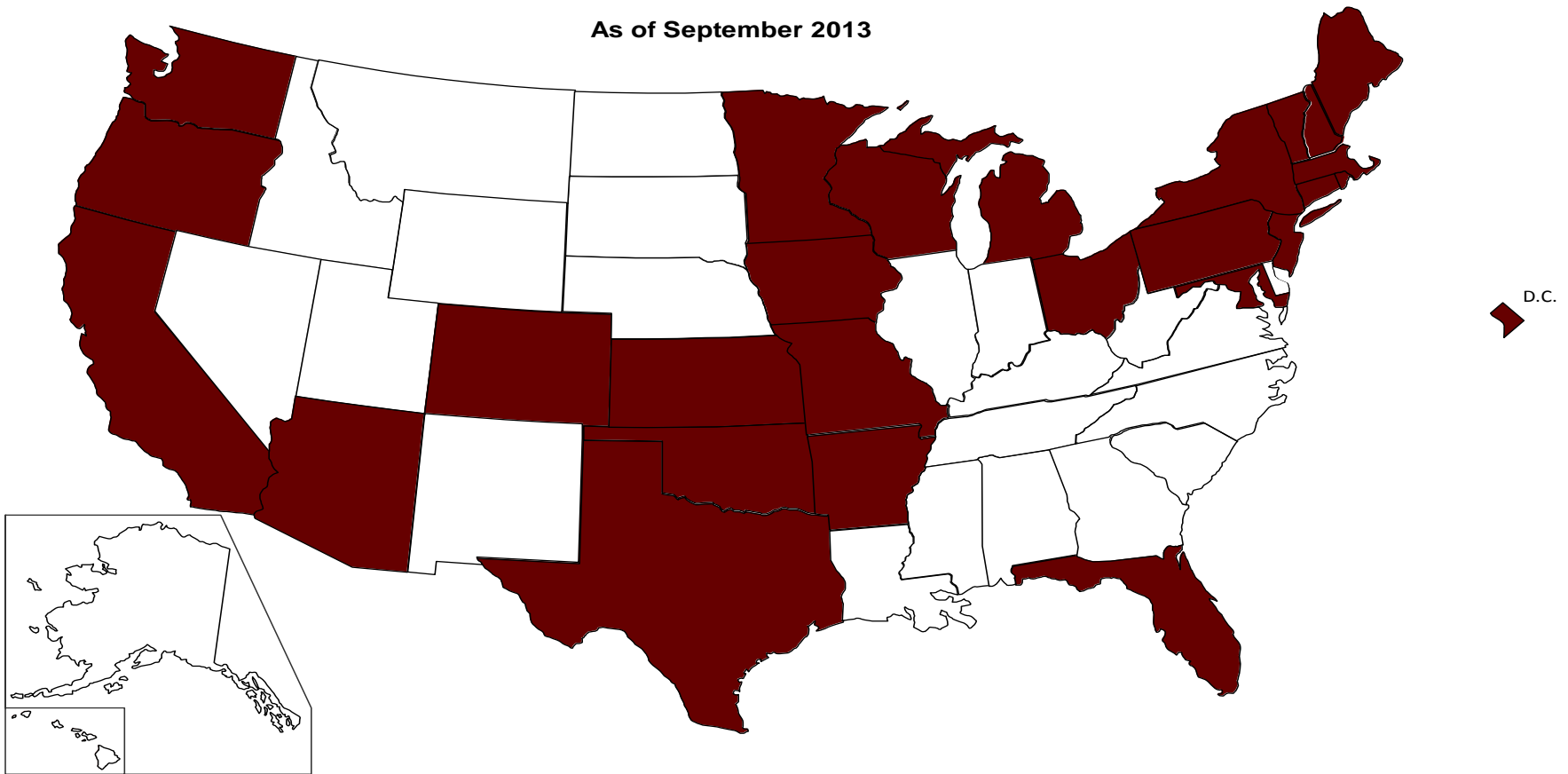

Take-up Rates	Jobs Saved Through Work Sharing
Average Take-up Rate (0.17%)	1,357
Above Average Take-up Rate (0.39%)	3,112
Exceptionally High Take-up Rate (0.86%)	6,863

Take-up Rates	Jobs Saved Through Work Sharing
Average Take-up Rate (0.17%)	2,040
Above Average Take-up Rate (0.39%)	4,680
Exceptionally High Take-up Rate (0.86%)	10,320
