Explanation

Column 1 - 80,772 workers have already reached the end of their EUC benefits. These workers benefited from the 2nd extension of jobless benefits but only received 7 additional weeks starting in November and ending in January on top of 13 weeks they received starting last July.

Column 2 - An additional 1.1 million workers will run out of their EUC benefits by June 2009, including those who have received the full 33 week extension available in high unemployment states. This longer extension will start to run out in April 2009.
