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Minimum Wage Impact and Poverty Rates

Minimum Wage Impact Estimates (Montgomery County):

- Workers who could benefit: Up to 106,764.1
- Five main occupational groups impacted:²
 - 1. Sales and related occupations.
 - 2. Food preparation and serving related occupations.
 - 3. Building and grounds cleaning and maintenance occupation.
 - 4. Personal care and service occupations.
 - 5. Healthcare support occupations.

Median wages for tipped workers (Montgomery and Frederick counties):³

- Waiters and waitresses: \$9.06
- Bartenders: \$10.05
- All tipped workers: \$12.13

Poverty in Montgomery County and Maryland:⁴

- Montgomery County: 6.9% (overall); 8.4% (child).
- Maryland: 10.0% (overall); 13.2% (child).

Workers in Poverty (Maryland):5

- Total: 86,000.
- Female: 44,000.

The vast majority of low-wage workers are adults (Maryland):6

- 90% are over the age of 20.
- 47% have some college experience.

Other Facts (National):

- Low-wage jobs will make up <u>6 of the 10</u> occupations with the largest project growth over the next decade.⁷
- Unless the minimum wage is increased, larger shares of Montgomery County (and MD) workers and their families will struggle to make ends meet on these low-wage jobs.

- When wages are too low, workers often have no choice but to rely on public assistance:
 - o 73% of enrollments are from working families.⁸
 - Annual cost per Walmart store: \$900,000 \$1.7 million.⁹
 - Annual cost of fast-food low wages: \$7 billion.¹⁰
 - Annual cost from 10 largest fast-food chains: \$3.9 billion.¹¹
- Higher wages are consistent with a profitable business model:¹²
 - Cost of turnover (fast-food): \$4,700 per employee.¹³
 - 89% of small businesses already pay more than minimum wage.¹⁴
 - 80% of business owners and executives at *companies of all sizes* support raising the minimum wage.¹⁵
 - 59% of *small businesses* support raising the minimum wage, and 77% of them already pay more than the required minimum.¹⁶
