DECLARATION OF MARLENE BURTON

Judge: Honorable Manish S. Shah

Marlene Burton hereby declares as follows:

- 1. I am a home care worker in the State of Illinois' Home Services Program. I am 50 years old and live in Chicago, Illinois.
- 2. I have been working in the Home Services Program since about 2007. I have provided care my current client for about three years. The types of care I provide range from: assisting with bathing, toileting, and grooming, to cooking, going grocery shopping, doing laundry, light housekeeping, and accompanying my client to medical appointments.
- 3. When I began working in the Home Services Program, the State automatically deducted fair-share fees from my wages to support my union representative, SEIU Healthcare Illinois & Indiana ("Union"). I had no objection to providing financial support for the Union. I knew the fees were ultimately going to support home care workers like myself. I believe that a strong union representative is necessary if home care workers are to be treated with the dignity

and respect that we deserve. I believe that all home care workers should pay their fair share to support the Union because all home care workers benefit from the Union's activities.

- 4. Our current Union contract provides for pay of \$13/hour for home care workers, a significant hourly increase from when I first started working in the Home Services Program. The contract also provides for the State to pay into a health benefits fund and for training. I do not believe that home care workers would have achieved this without a strong Union or that we will be able to continue to improve the status of home care workers without a strong Union.
- 5. I am particularly thankful for the health insurance coverage. Because of the work of the Union, I no longer have to be scared to go to the doctor because I don't know if I can pay for the appointment. With the insurance coverage, I know I can go to the doctor when I need to, and I believe my life and the lives of my children are better for it.
- 6. I have participated in several of the training classes, and I believe they have made me a better home care worker. In addition to teaching techniques and skills in caregiving, they also have helped me develop professionally. I believe the classes provide home care workers the chance to talk about our shared experiences and to learn from each other.
- 7. When I first started working in the Home Services Program, I remember receiving information about joining the Union. However, I had joined the Union through my work with a private home care agency and so I didn't think to join through the Home Services Program. I was quite familiar with the work the Union does, and the importance of becoming a Union member, but it just didn't occur to me to sign up. In about fall of 2013 I attended a training class where Union members reminded us to sign up on cards, and after being reminded, I signed up on the spot and have been a Union member ever since.

- 8. The Union has helped me stay informed about local and state politics and about policies that affect me and my clients. I do not believe that I would know about these issues, nor be as civically engaged without the Union. I believe the Union pushes me to be more involved in the democratic process.
- 9. I do not support the Harris v. Quinn lawsuit or the goal of the National Right to Work Legal Defense Fund to weaken our Union. I do not believe the named plaintiffs speak for me. I believe it is unfair that they are trying to weaken the Union that represents, and fights to improve the conditions for, all home care workers.

I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States that the foregoing is true and correct.
